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AGM Decisions: Important Updates



Thanks to all who attended the AGM and took part in a productive and thoughtful discussion. Your contributions help shape how we work together and care for the site. Minutes of the meeting will be shared in due course, but here are two important updates that came out of the meeting:

- **Fires**: Bonfires are not permitted during June, July, and August. Please refer to the recent email for guidance on fires generally, including BBQs.
- Acceptable Behaviours & Complaints: Guidance on acceptable behaviours and how complaints are handled has been shared for clarity. This has already been sent to all members.

Watering Guidance

With the growing season well underway, it's important we all do our bit to use water responsibly on site. Please keep the following in mind to help conserve water, maintain our infrastructure, and ensure fair use for everyone:

- Water early in the morning or in the evening to reduce evaporation and make the most of every drop.
- Be mindful that we all rely on the same water supply—please keep watering sessions to a minimum so everyone gets a fair chance to use it.



- Do not leave hoses connected to taps when not in use.
- Never leave taps running unattended.
- Avoid overspraying—water plants at the base where it's needed most.

A little care goes a long way—thank you for helping us look after this shared resource.

Allotment Awakenings: April's Growing Guide

April is the perfect time to get your allotment ready for the growing season. With longer days and warmer weather, there's plenty to do. Here's your quick guide to getting started this month.

1. Prepare Your Soil

Start by clearing weeds and adding compost or wellrotted manure to improve soil structure. This will help retain moisture and improve drainage for healthier crops.

2. Planting and Sowing

Now's the time to sow hardy crops like peas, carrots, parsnips, and potatoes. If the weather has been mild, also consider sowing broad beans and onions. Don't forget to plant hardy annuals like spinach, lettuce, and spring onions for an early harvest.

3. Protect Your Plants

Frosts can still occur in April, so protect tender plants with cloches, fleece, or cold frames on frosty nights. If you've started seedlings indoors, harden them off by gradually introducing them to the outdoors.

4. Tidy Up and Maintain

Give your tools a good clean and sharpen to ensure they're ready for use. Clear up any debris on your plot and organize your shed to keep everything in order.

5. Encourage Wildlife

Support pollinators by planting flowers like lavender, marigolds, and borage. Put out bird feed to attract birds that can help with pest control.

April is a month of preparation, planting, and protection. By focusing on soil health, planting hardy crops, and taking steps to protect your plants from frost, you'll be setting your allotment up for a successful growing season. Make sure to also incorporate general maintenance and wildlife support to create a thriving, sustainable space. Happy gardening!

Get Permission Before You Build

A quick reminder that permission is required before erecting any new sheds or temporary structures on your allotment. To ensure there are no issues with size, construction, design, or location, you must submit plans to the Committee before construction begins.

Additionally, any temporary structures must be built and maintained to a reasonable standard. This helps keep the allotment site neat and ensures that all structures are safe and appropriate for the space.

Please refer to the Terms and Conditions for full details and make sure to get approval before starting any new projects on your plot. This will save time and avoid any unnecessary complications.





Maintenance Reminders

A quick note from the maintenance team:

- Please don't leave unwanted items in front of the Trading Hut or dump rubbish anywhere on site—this is considered flytipping and creates extra work for volunteers. Take all waste home or dispose of it properly.
- Branches for dry hedging are available near the site entrance. These are ideal for reinforcing boundary plots and help deter trespassing, so please make use of them if you can.

Thanks for helping us keep the site tidy, safe, and secure for everyone.

Recipe of the Month

Rhubarb Crumble

Rhubarb crumble is the perfect dessert to enjoy as we head into spring! With rhubarb coming into season right now, it's a great time to harvest this tangy, vibrant plant from your allotment and whip up a comforting crumble. The tartness of the rhubarb pairs wonderfully with a sweet, buttery topping – a simple and satisfying treat that's sure to please!

Prep Time: 15 minutes Cook Time: 40-45 minutes

Ingredients

- 4 cups of rhubarb, chopped
- 1/2 cup sugar (or to taste)
- 1tsp vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup oats
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/4 cup cold butter
- 1/4 cup brown sugar

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190°C (375°F).
- 2. In a bowl, combine the rhubarb with sugar and vanilla extract. Place in a greased baking dish.
- 3. In a separate bowl, mix the oats, flour, and brown sugar. Add the cold butter and rub it into the dry ingredients until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs.
- 4.Sprinkle the crumble topping over the rhubarb and bake for 40–45 minutes, until the topping is golden and the rhubarb is bubbling.
- 5.Serve with a scoop of ice cream or custard.
